

RE:	Allegheny County voters divided on candidates, concerned about crime

Embold Research surveyed 860 likely November 7th voters in Allegheny County, PA from October 21-23, 2023¹ to examine support for candidates running for countywide office and voters' perceptions of crime. The survey has a margin of error of 3.5 percentage points.


Candidates vying for countywide office are neck-and-neck with their opponents. Both races are within the survey's margin of error.

Democrat Sara Innamorato leads Republican Joe Rockey by just 3 points in the race for Allegheny County Executive with 10% yet undecided. Innamorato is the better known of the two candidates, with just 9% saying they have never heard of her compared to 19% who have never heard of Rockey.

Incumbent District Attorney Stephen Zappala, running on the Republican ticket, has 46% of the vote compared to Democrat Matt Dugan's 45%, with 9% undecided.








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¹Polling was conducted online from October 21-23. Using Dynamic Online Sampling to attain a representative sample, Change Research polled 860 likely November 2023 general election voters in Allegheny County. Post-stratification was performed on age, gender, race/ethnicity, education, and 2020 presidential vote. Members of the Transparency Initiative disclose all relevant details about our research, with the principle that the public should be able to evaluate and understand research-based findings, in order to instill and restore public confidence in survey results.

Voters are concerned about crime, especially violent crime. Three-quarters or more (74%-88%) express concern about various types of crime in Allegheny County, with slightly less concern about property crime and more intense concern about violent crime, including rape and sexual assault as well as hate crimes.

Voters' Concern About Crime in Allegheny County



Likely November voters in Allegheny County have a strong preference for candidates who support survivors of rape and sexual assault. More than two-in-five (82%) say they would be more likely to vote for a candidate for countywide office who will advocate for survivors of rape and sexual assault, reducing barriers to reporting incidents of assault and promoting survivors' healing while holding offenders accountable. Half (51%) say they would be <u>much</u> more likely to vote for such a candidate.

Voters are concerned about the safety of Allegheny County's Jewish community. Most voters (82%) express concern about the safety of the county's Jewish community given the recent events in Israel/Gaza, including nearly half (47%) who say they are <u>very</u> concerned. Just 16% express little or no concern.

Issues pertaining to crime and public safety could tip the scales in countywide races. Given the competitiveness of both countywide races, candidates' ability to connect with voters on these issues–expressing support for survivors of sexual assault and hate crimes, and showing solidarity with the county's Jewish community–could sway the election in their favor.
