
RE: Allegheny County voters divided on candidates, concerned about crime

Embold Research surveyed 860 likely November 7th voters in Allegheny County, PA from October 21-23, 2023¹ to examine voters' perceptions related to personal safety, crime, and rape and sexual assault. The survey has a margin of error of 3.5 percentage points.

Voters are feeling less safe now compared to just five years ago. Nearly three-quarters (72%) say they feel less safe than they did five years ago, including one in four (28%) who say they feel <u>a lot</u> less safe. Allegheny women are somewhat more likely than men to feel less safe than they felt in the recent past.

Perceptions of personal safety






Q. Thinking about your personal safety, do you feel safer or less safe than you did five years ago?

¹Polling was conducted online from October 21-23. Using Dynamic Online Sampling to attain a representative sample, Change Research polled 860 likely November 2023 general election voters in Allegheny County. Post-stratification was performed on age, gender, race/ethnicity, education, and 2020 presidential vote. You can see a full methodology statement here, which complies with the requirements of AAPOR's Transparency Initiative. Members of the Transparency Initiative disclose all relevant details about our research, with the principle that the public should be able to evaluate and understand research-based findings, in order to instill and restore public confidence in survey results.

Voters, especially women, are deeply concerned about rape and sexual assault in Allegheny County. Four in five (79%) voters express concern about rape and sexual assault as well as hate crimes. Women, especially, report intense concern, with 40% of women saying they are *very* concerned about rape and sexual assault in the county.

Q. How concerned are you about rape and sexual assault in Allegheny County?

Likely November voters in Allegheny County have a strong preference for candidates who support survivors of rape and sexual assault. More than two-in-five (82%) say they would be more likely to vote for a candidate for countywide office who will advocate for survivors of rape and sexual assault, reducing barriers to reporting incidents of assault and promoting survivors' healing while holding offenders accountable. Half (51%) say they would be <u>much</u> more likely to vote for such a candidate.

Voters express strong support for the use of early evidence kits in Allegheny County, empowering survivors to gather their own evidence of assault. A strong majority (70%) of likely voters say they support the use of early evidence kits, which allow sexual assault survivors to gather their own evidence of their assault, rather than needing to go through a 4- to 6-hour long examination in a hospital after a traumatic event—a process that many survivors find too uncomfortable to go through. Just 15% oppose the use of early evidence kits in Allegheny County.
